
### 02a News article Worksheet

DARTMOUTH — An illustration by seventh grader Dylan Manchester-Rogers on the front page of the first issue of Big Green News captures what a lot of his classmates are likely feeling during the coronavirus pandemic.



“At first it felt like vacation but now it’s like we’re trapped in a bubble,” it reads, including drawings of three bubbles with figures inside them.

Students at Dartmouth Middle School are used to passing by each other in the halls, eating lunch with friends, hanging out after school or catching up during sports practice or clubs. As for many students, that normal routine has vanished since schools state-wide have been closed for about a month and remain closed at least through May 4.

Boucher knows what it’s like to have a parent as an essential worker. Her father works as a truck driver for a solid waste collection company, she said.

“I don’t really get to see him during the week, so I kind of dedicated this to him,” she said.

She misses eating lunch in the cafeteria and seeing people that were part of her routine. Due to the coronavirus, she’ll miss out on a trip to Six Flags with the band and chorus and yearbook signings, she said. But despite that, she understands how critical it is to social distance, keep in touch virtually, and try to keep a positive outlook.

“Every time we don’t keep our social distance, first responders pay the price and so do others,” she said.
